

Getting to know... Stevie and Hannah



Most PCC members who dance at the Harp know Stevie and Hannah Hogan, and many

of us shared their joy at their wedding last fall at the beautiful Springwood Conference Center. Their road to marriage was shorter than Jim and Joanne's, but more fraught with obstacles. And, appropriately, it started at our beloved Mullaney's Harp & Fiddle.

Stevie started coming to the Harp with their sister Bridget in 2012. Four years later, Marlee Ebbert started bringing a bunch of college friends to the Harp, after seeing an Irish dancing demonstration at Duquesne University. Hannah was among that group, and the Kidz Table in the corner was born. The future spouses started as friends, but a mutual attraction soon developed. In October 2016, Stevie asked Hannah out on their first date, for dinner and a Halloween movie. Anyone who knows – or has even seen - Hannah can imagine that a Halloween movie was probably the quickest way to her heart!

Stevie also did the proposing. Their plan was to make the proposal at the Harp, during a show-your-lady in one of the dances. Liz and the band members were in



on the scheme. One problem: the proposal was to take place in March of 2020. A little thing called Covid intervened.

So, the proposal was almost a year late and less public than planned. Stevie popped the question while the couple were watching the ball drop on the New Year of 2021. Instead of all their whole PCC family, the only audience was their dog, Buddy.

But the road to that happy

moment was longer than just the five years between 2016 and January 1, 2021.

During their early teens, Stevie suffered from migraine headaches so debilitating that they had to be homeschooled. Many days, all they could do was lie in bed and endure the pain. They felt like their illness made them a burden to their parents, and they became depressed. But the time alone gave them the opportunity to go inward. They confronted the growing realization that they felt attracted to girls, not boys. And a good therapist helped them to cope with the physical pain and the depression, and to accept their sexuality with their family's support.

Hannah's road to self-acceptance came later. She had felt attracted to women before, but had also been engaged for a time to a man. Because of her conservative Christian upbringing, she was reluctant to accept her attraction to women – until she met Stevie and fell in love. It was hard con't. on page 3

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Our Irish Ancestors

I don't have any good pictures of my great-grandfather whose parents were born in Ulster, but here is a picture of his brother, Patrick Grant. Although he died before I was born, I heard many colorful stories about Uncle Pat. He worked on the Trans-Siberian Railroad in the early 1920s and had to flee east ahead of the Bolsheviks. He escaped through Japan and brought home this beautiful silk embroidery, which hung in my

grandmother's house, then my mother's, and now mine. He invested in the stock market with the money he earned on the railroad, and was a paper millionaire for a short time. But he lost all of his money in the crash of 1929,

and had to move into my grandparents' already-crowded home. He worked for several years as a bartender at Corny Mann's Hotel in McKees Rocks. When World War Two started, his experience in railroading led to a job at Dravo, where he helped build the LSTs that were used in the D-Day invasion. Born in 1878, he died in 1952.



Alex Brown

This is a picture of Alex Brown's great great grandfather, James Duffy (1848 - 1921), with his wife, Alex's great great grandmother, Catherine Eccles (1856 - 1912). James was from Armagh, and Catherine was from Tyrone. They were married in Dungannon, and briefly moved in with relatives in Scotland. They arrived in the United States on August 23rd, 1882. They had ten daughters, pictured with a few of them here outside of their house in Greensburg, PA, which is still in the family.

My grandmother was an O'Leary. She is in the first row, right side. There were 11 children in her family, 8 girls and 3 boys. The oldest of the sisters died in childbirth and is not pictured here. When my great grandfather Patrick passed away in 1904, my great grandmother Mary Ann moved the family from their farm in Penn Hills to Wilkinsburg so the girls could find husbands. Lol!

The O'Learys came from Cork. The siblings in my grandmother's generation produced 100 first cousins. Wow!

My great great grandfather left Ireland and moved to Wales in the 1840s before emigrating to the U.S. They settled in Pittsburgh around 1880.

Fun fact: my great great grandmother was 17 years older than my great great grandfather.

My father's name was Manus Joseph McIntyre. He was born in Donegal, Ireland in 1924. He came to the United States when he was 10 months old. He attended Central Catholic School. He lied about his age and joined the Marines at 16.

After he was discharged, he married my mother, who was not Irish, and was never really accepted by my father's Irish parents. They called her the gypsy. My parents had eight

children.

My father worked many jobs, sometimes two at a time to support his eight children, but ultimately retired as a supervisor at the U.S. Postal Service.

My father never danced but he encouraged all of my siblings and me to take Irish dancing when we were younger. And as an aside, my father was responsible for introducing (Robert) Dutch Creely to the Pittsburgh Ceili Club. Dutch was quite active in the Club and often brought his whole family to the Kick-Offs.

My grandmother, my father's mother, was Rose Boyle McIntyre. (She is in the picture) She came over to this country with my father and her other children, including Cecilia Royle. My grandfather came separately. Cecilia (Cel) is Maureen Strotmeyer's mother and my aunt.

revealing to her family that she was in love with Stevie and they were moving in together. Her mother wanted her gone immediately. That sparked a crisis, during which PCC friends came to the rescue. Theresa Orlando gave the couple a place to live for a few days. Kidz Corner friends went to Hannah's house to move her possessions to the apartment. Hannah says that it was the love shown to her by not only Stevie, but by all of her friends in the Pittsburgh Ceili Club, that helped her to be who she'd really wanted to be all along.

I asked Stevie and Hannah what they each love the most about each other. Stevie mentioned Hannah's big heart, her loyalty and protectiveness. Hannah mentioned Stevie's always putting others before themself. Stevie was modest about that, attributing it to a family who raised them in a Catholic tradition of always helping others.

Future plans for the couple include owning a home and having children, either biologically or by adoption. They want to both build stability and keep the humor in their lives. They do this by being goofy together and never going to bed mad. And they want to keep dancing forever. "Kidz Table Forever!"

I am thankful to this brave young couple for being so open with me. I think the message their story conveys is simply that love helps us to be our truest and best selves. The love of their family, a competent therapist and loyal friends helped Stevie to become who they are. The love of the PCC helped Hannah to live the life she wants to live. It reminds me of one of my favorite quotes from Julian of Norwich: "You seek to know the Lord's intention in this. Love. Love was his intention." Love is always his intention.
